were interviewed by Teresa Mannion and featured on RTE news.








STEM@Taylors

Maths Week Competitions

As part of Maths Week, 2nd, TY and 5th year students took part in the Irish Maths Teachers' Association Maggie Gough competition. There were 15,795 entries from 182 schools across the country. From this, 59 students achieved a score of 95 or more and were awarded an individual trophy for their efforts. Additionally, another 44 students who scored 93 or 94 were awarded a medal for their results. 5th year student Evangela Thomas (below left) was one of the top achieving students in the country and was awarded a trophy. Yichen Liu (below right) in TY was awarded a medal for her results.





Robotics

On Wednesday January 15th our VEX
Robotics team took part in the VEX V5 High
Stakes competition in ATU Galway. Each year,
a new game is released. Students have to
design, build and code a robot to take part in
the game. This year's game involved placing
plastic ring doughnuts on stakes.

Our team started working on the design and build back in September, with a practice day taking place in ATU in November. After some modifications were made by the team, they were ready to take on the main competition.

After the final of all 26 qualifier matches,
Dominican College were in top position!
This meant they were given the first option of picking another school to join up with for the finals. After making an alliance with St
Colman's Claremorris, Taylor's were ready to head into the finals.

Dominican College were awarded the prize for Robot Skills Champion for the driver Cristina Prieto and the overall Excellence Award for best team on the day. Well done to all who took part, especially driver Cristina Prieto, coder Leah Curran,

main builders Lara Curran and Erinlee Diviney, and Engineer Report Book writer Aoibheann Reid.

The team has now qualified for the National Final in Cork in February.
